Mike King's Community Korero

Mental health hero Mike King brought his Community Korero to Marton this week.

Mike King spoke to Year 7-13 children from local schools on Monday and Tuesday in Marton, as well as holding a free parents' evening.

He spoke to about 50 parents on Monday evening at Rangitikei College. He passed on his passion about mental health and shared good and funny messages with parents.

He was accompanied by a 17 year old girl who suffers from mental health problems and had been in care for 6 months. She told her story to the audience and enlightened the parents about what had worked for her as she works through the effects of her disease.

Mental health issues seriously affect communities throughout New Zealand. Last year Rangitikei locals raised over \$40,000 through the Black Dog Ball. This money was then entrusted to Marton Counselling Centre, Rural Support Trust and to Mike King's Key to Life charity.

Community Korero is an early evening community event that runs in conjunction with the Cool to Korero school programme, in which the school talk/korero is designed to empower young people to find solutions to their problems and makes it "ok to talk."

The Community Korero reinforces the need for adults to listen. "After all, there is no point in getting youth to open up if nobody is listening,"says King.

Over the course of the parents' evening, Mike King shared his story with the community, before branching out and talking about the problems faced by today's youth. They include: bullying, peer pressure, drugs and alcohol, sex abuse, divorce,



sexuality and disconnection at home and in school. Parents came away from the event armed with useful information and tools needed to make a positive difference in homes and in our communities.

Reminder to duck shooters Horizons Regional Council to secure firearms

Constable Luke Shannon from Marton Police reminds duckshooters to properly secure their firearms.

This follows an incident in which a firearm was found in a hotel carpark in Marton, leaning against a vehicle, unsecured while the owner celebrated opening day inside the bar.

When Police were made aware of this, a further eight firearms were found inside unsecure vehicles in the same carpark.

The firearms were seized and the owners could have their Firearms Licences revoked.

"This is not an isolated incident and duck shooters and hunters alike need to be reminded that firearms need to be properly secured and not left unsupervised in vehicles. It is not acceptable that vehicles are left unlocked with firearms inside in plain view,"says Constable Shannon. "Licence holders need to be vigilant and security conscious. These firearms are easy targets for criminals and one firearm in the wrong hands is one too many. Police will not hesitate to seize firearms from unsecured



upgrades to flood protection in the lower Manawatū are ticking along steadily behind the scenes.



Rangitikei heritage on show this weekend



For those with a historical interest or those just wanting a great day or two out, come along to this year's 'Rangitikei Heritage Weekend' - when all five Museums in the Rangitikei will be open both Saturday and Sunday.

This is the 10th year the event has run, with increasing numbers visiting the district's museums each year. The date is always the weekend that falls closest to the date when the Deed of Purchase was signed and the first of the Rangitikei blocks were made available for purchase - on 18 May 1849.

Rangitikei Heritage Weekend was developed to celebrate all that has happened from those early days of settlement, to being the lush and productive place that the Rangitikei is today.

This year's theme is 'Characters of the Past' with stories being told at each museum about famous and infamous characters who have left their historical mark on the Rangitikei.

Mangaweka Museum plans to do "billy teas" over the camp fire, with jam cakes, all for a gold coin donation, plus usual and special displays to entertain the younger and older attendees.

Bulls Museum will be doing a feature on Dr Watson, who among other things, was well known for his generosity, giving

sweets to children. Bulls plan to follow the tradition for those doing the rounds!

Marton will be showing story display boards of various accounts and photos of Marton characters from the past including Hon Norman Shelton MP and Miss L E Cook OBE, the founder of Marton Plunket Society. Hunterville Settlers Museum will have its usual displays housed in the former Courthouse, Craig's Crib (old blacksmiths shop) plus Ropers Cottage, displaying a full 1900's dwelling.

Taihape Museum and Rose Cottage intend to display snippets of several local people and concentrate on Morton Coutts and Dame Cecily Pickerill.

So, plenty to see and do over the two days.

Visitors to two or more museums over the weekend can be in to win a limited edition, full colour, A2 sized printed canvas of the Rangitikei River and papa cliffs. You can enter at the museums.

Some of the topics covered in the book include housing options, equipment and other support, emergency planning, scam watch, emotional wellbeing and depression, dementia, equity release, end of life planning, superannuation and financial assistance, getting help at home, retirement villages and residential care.

"Age Concern can guide the elderly and their families towards the many support groups that are available in Whanganui, so I recommend Age Concern as the first point of contact for sourcing information and advice," Mrs Bunn says. "Community House also keeps a comprehensive list of current organisations working in the local community to support older people."

Off road electric bike made in Taihape

Taihape man Kevin Marshall, reckons the world's automotive future is heading towards battery power and so he built an off road bike that is powered by a lithium battery. The bike will travel at a constant 12 kph on flat land and run for about 20 km before needing a recharge. "It's a pretty expensive hobby but this being my prototype, works well, now that all the little problems have been solved," he said.

"I would like to sell this bike to fund another, with perhaps an aluminium frame, which would make it lighter."

In order to keep costs down, Kevin designed and cut the box steel that makes up the frame and the local engineering works welded it together. He searched the internet for the component parts saying that just about everything is made in China.

Kevin has ridden the bike through farmlands and back country roads. He says DOC is using battery powered bikes in some areas 'because they are quiet'. Dairy farmers are using them as well.

New standards will be introduced by the country's largest body of panelbeaters to cope with increasing numbers of electric vehicles (EVs), hybrids and vehicles equipped with advanced safety technology on Rangitikei/Manawatu/Whanganui roads

Ministry of Transport statistics say, Manawatu/Whanganui region has the ninth highest rate of EV and hybrid ownership in NZ with 189 registered throughout the region.

Collision Repair Assn spokesperson Neil Pritchard says the industry is moving to stay ahead of rapid evolution in car manufacturing which is increasing the complexity of vehicle repairs.

He says the lack of regulation in the collision repair market can create quality control issues for consumers and this situation is getting worse with the introduction of more cars equipped with active safety systems and the increased use of exotic materials in the vehicle manufacturing process. "With the increase of EVs, self-driving technology and new types of construction materials, vehicle manufacturing has seen more advancement over the last decade than over the past century While EVs are touted as having a reduced need for mechanical servicing, when it comes to collision repairs, there is a significant increase in the risk and repair complexity.'

"Around 91 light EVs were registered in this region last year. Pritchard says EVs bring with them their own set of challenges when damaged. "Like all alkali metals, lithium is highly reactive and flammable and the risk associated with lithium-ion batteries found in EVs adds a high level of complexity to the repair process." He says the elevated risk of fire also prevents the vehicle from entering a spray booth. which means the panelbeater must introduce processes specific to that type of vehicle to complete the repair.

He says approved Collision Repair Association members in NZ will display 'Licensed Collision Repairer' on their signage.




