

Weather Outlook

NIWA reports high confidence of March - May 2018 temperatures forecast to be above average for all regions

With high confidence (60 to 70% chance). As autumn progresses however, frosts may occur from time to time in cooler locations.

For central North Island - Taranaki, Whanganui, Manawatu, Wellington - temperatures are very likely to be above average (70% chance). Rainfall totals, soil moisture levels and river flows are all most likely to be above normal (45 to 50% chance).

Rainfall totals are forecast to be above normal in the North Island and in the north of the South Island and about equally likely to be near normal or above normal, in the west and east of the South Island. Soil moisture levels and river flows are forecast to be above normal in the north and west of the North Island.





Don't make riding habit of it

A Marton reader pointed out the name and unusual service offered, indented on the top of Marton's Broadway historic corner building where Petals and Presents is located. It reads "habit makers...".

It's interesting how the meaning of a term can changesover time. These



At the time the business operated however, a habit maker was a maker of women's riding habits. I have it on good authority, that a riding habit is the skirt women wore (and still wear) while riding side-saddle.

It is a specially designed skirt or "habit" with a short back and long skirt front, that allowed women to look feminine when riding side saddle. The skirt clips together at the back once the women had descended from the horse.

There are still riding habit makers, who make the skirts for historical purposes and for side saddle competitions, like those run by the NZ Side Saddle Association, which is keeping the art alive and well and women wear jodhpurs underneath their habits now but happily the practise is a drug free pastime and not too habit forming.

When the Son of Man is Lifted Up

What is it about Christ's death on the cross that draws us to Him? There is something there beyond the tragedy and the sorrow that, with the eyes of faith, yet stirs our hearts in hope. 

Lent then is a time to come close to the Lord in His suffering in our own hearts, minds and bodies; in prayer, in acts of sacrifice, and in coming close to those who suffer in our world, both near at hand and far away.

May our sharing in the sufferings of the Lord in these ways, and in the other personal ways that He calls us to, lead us to celebrate and share in God's redeeming love and New Life at our Easter feast.

gardening by Wally Richards

SULPHUR/SULFUR

I have written about this subject in the past and recently have come across more information that may be of interests to both aspects, gardening and health.

Sulphur is the tenth most common compound found on the planet.

Sulfur is a part of some of the amino acids in your body and is involved in protein synthesis, as well as several enzyme reactions It helps with the production of collagen, which is a substance that forms connective tissues, cell structure and artery walls.

Sulphur extracted from plants, in this case pine trees, results from the pulping process and is called

From DMSO it is distilled three times to obtain white sulphur crystals called MSM. MSM is a food supplement which a small amount is

taken twice a day.

Initially, people experience a detox after which they find they have more energy, sleep better, improved memory, complexion, hair, nails, skin and some health issues such as pain and mobility may improve.

If you are a keen gardener and grow a good amount of your food, then you could take MSM till the cows come home and it would make no noticeable difference. I have not met many people in that category

In the garden, you should apply gypsum which is natural sulphur and calcium with a neutral pH. To ensure that your produce has sulphur available as they are growing.

This week, I received information in regards to sulphur and from what I read, it could mean something as simple as having sufficient sulphur in your diet or as a supplement, could reduce dramatically your chances of some life threatening conditions, including cancer! So, maybe a very simple thing like sulphur can make a big difference to our well being.

Bulls Community Centre -Tenders to be Called

At its meeting on 1 March 2018, Council agreed to call for tenders for the construction of the new Bulls Community Centre at Criterion Street, Bulls, once the detailed specifications have been completed, which is expected by the end of March. The tender evaluation panel will include at least one representative from a local authority, which has constructed a comparable facility within the last five years, and an engineer not associated with development of the design of the Bulls facility.

The decision to proceed to construction will be made by Council having regard to tenders received, confirmed project costs and the level of funding secured.

MoU Organisations Selected

For some years, Council has had a memorandum of understanding with various community trusts to provide a range of community services and events in Bulls, Marton and Taihape. Council considered work plan proposals from prospective partnering organisations and decided to enter into a threeyear contract with Project Marton (for Marton) and the Bulls and District Community Trust (for Bulls). In both cases there will be negotiation on specific matters, with the revised work programmes going to the relevant Community Committees in April.

In Taihape, Council decided to enter into a one-year trial with the Taihape Community Development Trust and Mokai Patea Services, on a similar basis as the Bulls and Marton organisations. This is the

first time Council has contracted two community organisations within a particular location.

Roading Contracts Approved

For the past three years Higgins Contractors have had the road maintenance contract for the District. Council has now approved a three-year extension of this contract, from 1 July 2018 to 30 June 2021 up to a value of \$25.5 million (plus GST).

Council awarded Contract 1078 - for dropout repairs on Watershed Road - to Higgins Contractors Ltd. The total value is nearly \$450,000 (plus GST). Seven sites along the road were damaged by storms in April and July 2017. Work typically involves the retreat of the carriageway in to the adjacent bank, i.e. moving away from the underslip on the other side of the road.

Progress with Consultation Document for the 2018-28 Long Term Plan

Council's auditors were present at Council's meeting to explain the audit process (including the 'hot review' undertaken by the Office of the Auditor-General). One important issue raised was whether Council's preferred option over waste management and minimisation was to introduce kerb-side recycling (on a fortnightly basis) throughout the District's urban areas. If this was the case, it needed to be reflected in the budgets (from 2019/20, when such a service, if agreed to following deliberations on submissions, would start). Council confirmed that position.

The Consultation Document will be adopted at

Council's meeting on 29 March 2018, together with a number of other documents to be consulted on at the same time - notably, the Waste Management and Minimisation Plan, the Schedule of Fees and Charges and the Rates Remission Policy on Māori freehold land.

Cemetery Management

Council has accepted the request from the remaining two trustees of the Ohingaiti cemetery that it assumes direct management and control of the Ohingaiti Cemetery as soon as practicable. Trustees have been looking after this cemetery since 1924. Council will be taking steps to improve the state

of the Tiriraukawa cemetery (at the corner of Tiriraukawa and Ngahuinga Roads). It was closed by Order in Council 52 years ago. The last burial was in 1959. There are only three headstones evident.

Council has agreed to extend the contract for sexton services at the cemeteries for a further two years.

New Zealand War Memorial Museum at Le Quesnoy, France

Following discussion with mayors of other councils and with the local RSA, Council agreed to make a contribution of \$2,000 to the New Zealand Memorial Trust. The Trust is purchasing the historic former Mayor's residence in Le Quesnoy, to provide a museum, to be open by 4 November 2018 – the centenary of the liberation of the town by New Zealand troops without bombardment.




