Dogs day out

Winner of the gruelling 21st Shepherd's Shemozzle race on Saturday was Feilding's Angus McKelvie, for the third time. He retained the coveted SBJ Shield (named in honour of Hunterville drover Jack Henry) and won \$1000 & Black Hawk products. The first woman home was Katie Herries from Gisborne with dog Made. She won \$500 and Black Hawk products.

As well as the thrilling Children's and Teens Shemozzles a Huntaway bark-up was held launching the Will To Live - a campaign set up to help young rural males who are amongst the most vulnerable to suicide. The campaign is designed to encourage such men to speak up if they need to talk and it will travel around rural NZ. Shepherds asked hundreds of huntaway dogs to bark up - reflecting a tradition for shepherds and dogs when Huntaways work together on high country farms.

Huntaway Festival committee secretary Christine Whinn says the organisers were very happy with the overall event on Saturday. "A massive, massive thank you to all of the volunteers, marshals and sponsors. Without them there would not be a Huntaway Festival and Shemozzle - it would not happen."

She says numbers of spectators were a just little down, as the wet weather report kept some away but on the day the weather was kind to them and everything went without a hitch.

"There was something different happening in all different places around the festival, which kept people busy."

There were plenty of overseas visitors at the festival, some form as far away as Portugal.

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

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
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Rangitikei Country Music Club marks 30 years

Rangitikei Country Music Club celebrated its thirtieth anniversay recently. It was celebrated a few months late, due to other club commitments earlier in the year.

Founded on 6 March 1988 - by the late Turi Morrell. Turi placed an advert in the paper for all those interested in forming a country music club to meet at the Methodist Church Hall Marton. A committee was formed and the Rangitikei Country Music Club was established. Originally named the Marton Country Music Club the name was changed shortly afterwards to the Rangitikei Country Music Club to incorporate a wider area. Some of the original band members were Ron Puki, Mary Gilbert, Don Kui, Peter Ratana, Turi Morrell, Henry Fullerton-Smith, John White and Trevor Munt. The patron in the early vears was Bessie Fullerton-Smith.

The club has been located in several venues over the years but has been based in its current clubrooms in Wellington Rd, Marton for 19 years. The club has seen many changes over the years but has gone from strength to strength with a current membership of seventy three. There are two special people - Colleen Hill and Robert Rogers - who have attended club gatherings almost from day one, followed closely by Glynis Southall.

The club's aim is to encourage and foster country music and to encourage people who wish to sing. Though it is an amateur show, the group tries to maintain a high level of competency and provide a practice every two weeks when folks are encouraged and helped to upskill their ability.

On average, there are between thirty and forty singers on a club day. Country Music has changed over the yearsn from the three chord songs to the more difficult. People can sing any genre of country music they like. The current band consists of Sue and Boss Te Rangi, Glynis Southall and Derek Wilson and they will accommodate singers.

Club member Glynis Southall says, "We are proactive thinking - of different events to hold within the club to keep things interesting. We usually put a float in the Christmas parade thanks to Marton's Central ITM. Six years ago Rangitikei Country Music Club held a special Awards weekend which is now held annually and attracts contestants from all over the country. These are held over Queen's Birthday Weekend at Rangitikei College Marton."

To celebrate thirty years, the committee provided a meal for all members and an interesting slide show was running showing photos of the club's activities over the thirty years. After the meal, the band kicked off an evening of singing and dancing and everyone enjoyed a very entertaining evening.

Glynis says, "Our clubrooms have a country ambience about them and we have a friendly atmosphere. We also provide popular and a delicious afternoon tea. We always need people in the audience therefore you don't have to be singer - come along and listen and enjoy the company of others. Our Club Days are held on the 1st and 3rd Sundays and we are situated

on Wellington Rd in Marton.

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
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

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Not so pretty in pink

There's an invasion happening in the Rangitikei district and while it might look pretty, it's definitely a problem.

Pink ragwort has been around in the area for a number of years, and it is spreading fast. This attractive, pink-flowered plant is originally from South Africa, and it is doing very well in this area; colonising roadsides and railway lines and spreading onto farmland.

The plant is very invasive and can take over farm pastures very quickly. It can also be toxic to cattle, although generally they don't eat it. The main issue is that it can infest pasture heavily, reducing the amount of grazing available to animals.

The seed is spread by the wind, and it can stay dormant for several years until conditions are right for germination. The seeds need light and when an area of trees is cleared, it is often replaced by a thick covering of pink ragwort.

A number of groups and individuals asked Horizons Regional Council to class pink ragwort as a pest plant, in submissions to the Regional Pest Management Plan in 2015. However, the Council has decided to monitor it, to see if it becomes a problem.

If you spot pink ragwort on your property, the best option is to dig it up and dispose of the plant as quickly as possible. They're flowering now, so before long, the seeds will be on the wind and spreading further around the district.

DairyNZ urges farmers to have a say on NAIT

DairyNZ is encouraging dairy farmers to make a submission on the Ministry for Primary Industries' (MPI) latest consultation on how the NAIT (National Animal Identification and Tracing) scheme can be improved.

MPI is now calling for feedback on proposed changes to the NAIT Act 2012 and regulations. The Ministry says the aim is to improve how biosecurity risks are managed and to enhance the traceability of animals.

"It's vital that dairy farmers take a close interest in what is being proposed, given the importance of biosecurity to the sector and to New Zealand," said DairyNZ chief executive Dr Tim Mackle.

"Mycoplasma bovis has highlighted the importance of an effective traceability scheme and every farmer should take the opportunity to express their view.

"We encourage farmers to look at the proposed changes on MPI's website and provide their feedback.'

The proposed changes fall into two categories: those arising from the NAIT review undertaken earlier this year by OSPRI (the organisation that oversees the scheme) and also from changes generated by learning from the M. bovis response.

"We are working with MPI to further understand how these changes will impact on dairy farmers. DairyNZ will also be submitting our feedback on the proposed changes," said Mr

Mackle.

In general terms, the proposed changes include the following:

PICA (person in charge of an animal) would now cover corporate bodies as well as individuals. For example, this will cover everyone in charge of animals and now matches the requirements in other legislation, such as the Animal Welfare Act 1999.

Nine of Nga Tawa's Year 13 students have landed tertiary scholarships for the 2019 academic year, totalling \$121,000 collectively.

Five scholarships have been awarded to girls going on to study at Otago University, three to Victoria University and one to Auckland University.

"I'm delighted and very proud that 20% of our Year 13 group is being recognised for achievement at this level," says Nga Tawa Principal Lesley Carter.

"Providing academic pathways underpins our Nga Tawa curriculum. The number of our Year 13 students going on to tertiary education is now consistently above 90% (97.2% in 2017).

For the second year running, Nga Tawa achieved a 100% pass rate across all NCEA Levels in 2017. Their Level 1 and Level 3 results were the highest they have been in more than five years and 45.5 per cent of students at NCEA Level 1 attained excellence endorsed.

Head girl, Bridget Bone is the recipient of two scholarships. She has been awarded an Otago University Academic Excellence scholarship worth \$35,000 and a University of Auckland Top Achiever scholarship worth \$20,000.

"It was such a tough decision, but I've decided to study Health Science at Otago University and have accepted a place in Carrington Hall," says Bridget.

"\$35,000 definitely made Otago a very attractive option. I'm really excited."

More scholarships are to be announced in the coming weeks.

Representation Review

At its meeting on 18 October 2018, Council considered submissions to its initial representation review proposal, which was to change from a five ward structure to a three ward structure (effectively combining Hunterville with Marton, and Turakina with Bulls). Although there were eight submissions from Turakina and Ratana seeking the reinstatement of the Turakina Ward, Council considers the three ward structure is the most effective, particularly because smaller communities like Turakina and Hunterville have Community Committees and Council is committed to retaining these in the altered ward structure.

One change has been made to the initial proposal. That is to align the boundaries of the Taihape Community Board with those of the proposed Northern Ward. This is logical since the Councillors appointed to the Board will be elected for the Northern Ward.

The final proposal is now open to appeal (from those who submitted to the initial proposal) or objection (from anyone), the closing date is 11 December 2018. If there are any appeals or objections, Council must refer them to the Local Government Commission, who makes a binding

Ngā Wai Totā o Te Waiū

Part 3 of the Deed of Settlement with Ngati Rangi-'Te Waiū-o-Te-Ika – Whangaehu River' notes the establishment of Ngā Wai Totā o Te Waiū, a joint eight-member committee of Horizons Regional Council, Ruapehu, Rangitīkei and Whanganui District Councils (who each nominate a member) together with members nominated by trustees of Te Tōtarahoe o Paerangi, Ngati Apa, the Uenuku

Charitable Trust and the Whanganui Land Settlement Negotiation Trust. The Committee's purpose is to advance the health, well-being and integrated management of the Whangaehu River catchment. Council has nominated Cr Angus Gordon to be its representative.

Out for Consultation

Consultation on the Animal Control Bylaw starts on 1 November until 3 December 2018. The proposed changes include a permit system for bees in urban areas. Council also wishes to know whether the communities of Koitiata, Scotts Ferry, Ohingaiti, Mangaweka, Utiku and Ratana still wish to be included in the urban area restrictions under the bylaw. Oral submissions will be heard at Council's meeting on 13 December 2018

Also being consulted on is a proposed policy on incentivising residential development. This provides for a \$5,000 remission of rates for new buildings, whether constructed as new or relocated into the Rangitīkei District. The proposed policy also provides that a subdivided property would be rated on the pre-subdivision basis for up to three years, on the area not yet sold, and sections which were sold would get lower rates for the first year.

Annual Report for 2017/18

Council adopted the Annual Report on 11 October 2018, having received an unmodified opinion from Audit New Zealand. This means that the information and disclosures comply with legal requirements and accounting standards. Council achieved an operating surplus for the year of \$686,000. No external borrowing was required during the year because of the under-expenditure in capital work arising from delays in resource consenting for wastewater

upgrades and the longer than projected time needed to complete the design for the proposed new Bulls Community Centre. 78% of the targeted levels of service

The report is available on the Council's website, the Marton office and the libraries in Taihape, Marton and Bulls. A Summary is being audited and will be available by mid-November.

Final proposal for representation arrangements for the 2019 local elections

Submissions

On 18 October 2018 the Rangitikei District Council considered the submissions received on its initial proposal regarding the representation arrangements for the Council and its constituent community boards; to apply for the local elections to be held on 12 October 2019.

The Council received 12 submissions on its proposal.

Four submissions were in favour of the Council's proposal. Eight submissions contained objections to various elements of the proposal, as follows:

- · three submitters considered that Ratana would not be represented fairly;
- one submitter considered the present five-ward structure allows a better chance of a representative from Ratana and/or the surrounding area;
- one submitter considered that Ratana needs a local representative;
- one submitter considered that the voice of the western areas of the District would less likely to be heard in the proposed Southern Ward and there needs to be representation by someone who understands the needs of the present Turakina Ward;
- one submitter considered that there was no commonality between Bulls and Turakina and the chance of someone from the western communities being elected in the proposed Southern Ward was small.
- one submitter considered that the proposed change to three wards put voting power in the hands of larger concentrations of population.

Final proposal

Having considered all of the submissions, the Council resolved to adopt its initial proposal as the Council's final proposal, subject to the following amendment:

• the boundaries for the Taihape Community Board be those for the proposed Northern Ward (rather than the boundaries of the current Taihape Ward).

The Council considers that this boundary change is appropriate for the following reason:

• it is logical that the proposed Northern Ward boundaries are those for the Taihape Community Board as the Northern Ward is the basis for electing the Ward Councillors who would be part of the membership of the Taihape Community Board.

The Council rejected the other matters raised in objections for the following reasons:

- The changes in relative population of the District's different communities have been addressed by the proposed three ward structure;
- The proposed three ward structure increases accessibility of elected members, as each ward has at least three elected members. At present, the Turakina and Hunterville Wards have only one member each.
- Council considers that the number of elected members in each ward is sufficient to ensure representation of all communities of interest.
- Council considers that combining communities of interest for Hunterville and Marton is a more desirable solution
- than splitting these communities of interest (which is what occurs under the present five ward structure).

 The District's smaller communities, in Turakina and Hunterville, are represented well by their
- respective Community Committees (which Council intends to retain, if supported by those communities);
- Council has proposed the continuation of the Ratana Community Board.

Therefore, the final proposal is as follows.

Council Representation

The Taihape and Ratana Community Boards will each elect four members. They will not be subdivided for electoral purposes. The Taihape Community Board will have two appointed members and the Ratana Community Board will have one appointed member as follows:

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
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
