

First at the pump




George London (pictured) has the distinction of being the first customer to use the newly installed Marton New World self-service petrol pumps.

G-Mech opened for business in mid-October, offering mechanical services and light engineering.

It's located in an historic building at 8 Hammond St in Marton. It has an engineering history as the former Nielsen's Engineering so G-Mech has retained some of the historic features, including keeping the original name etched on the outside.

Brad Glasgow is the name behind G-Mech. He is a fully qualified automotive mechanic, with 20 years' experience in the industry and with roots in light engineering.

Brad says he has been working towards opening his own business for some time but now the time is right. He began his career under Tom Lawlor at Lawlor and Bowler Motors at Mt View near Marton and over the years, worked at four different companies, doing a wide variety of vehicle mechanics, from trailers and agricultural machinery, to race cars. He has also specialised in classic cars.

He has a personal history of working on modified performance vehicles and now he is ready to work on any type of vehicle, as well as providing light engineering – a G-Mech service which is

already proving popular. "Since opening, I have already seen a lot of light engineering work come in the door, which is positive, but I am happy to look at any job," says Brad. He has broad auto mechanical knowledge and is well worth a visit if you need

his help. G-Mech also stocks batteries and tyres and covers mechanical and WOF repairs, tune ups, auto electrical and exhaust work, welding and aluminium welding.

G-Mech is open weekdays and Saturday mornings.

50 year design career

Garth Emerson has been an integral part of the Gallagher company in Marton for the past 50 years and had a hand in designing groundbreaking petrol pump technology.

Garth started work at Production Engineering Ltd (now Gallagher) soon after leaving school 50 years ago - on 11.11. 1968. In those days, the company operated both a cast iron and aluminium foundry, a hark back to production contracts during WW2.

As a young teenager, originally employed as an apprentice fitter and turner, he was quickly invited to become an apprentice toolmaker, working under the guidance of company founder, Reg Williams and Snow (Arthur) Campbell.

Garth says even before being employed there, he used to take a sneaky look in the

back door of the original workshop when it was situated on Wellington Rd, where the Rangitikei Squash courts are now located. One emplyed by the firm he began learning all the disciplines of engineering and hydraulics, producing production jigs and fixtures plus casting patterns for the foundry. He also served time on the production lathes, mills

an drilling machines in the workshop. "It was health and safety nightmare compared to the present day," he says. Garth's first introduction to the design side of the company was when he helped Reg design and productionise an Auto-Stop Petrol Pump Nozzle. Then he travelled around NZ servicing and installing this revolutionary dispensing nozzle.

His next major step was moving to the "front of the building" where he played a major part in designing and productionising the EMPEC 80 electronic petrol pump. It was a big step forward in petrol pump technology worldwide, replacing the mechanical counters with LCD displays and introducing microprocessor-controlled pumps. It was said that John Williams had to mortgage his house to pay for just four huge microprocessors from Silicon Valley for the original pump development and they were locked away each night.

Garth has had a hand in every pump model produced since, until recently, when the new generation Pulse range, currently produced at Gallagher, but he still carries out pump reviews to ensure they are fit for purpose.

He says, "I also worked on product brochures and manuals. In fact, I think I have done most jobs in the company except the banking."

Garth says the number of staff he has seen come and go is mind boggling.

The Gallagher Group took over in May 1999. He has also seen several general managers, including Reg Williams, John Williams, Tony Dobbs and currently, Richard Coxon. Garth says there is very little of the original building left untouched in Station Rd. It has changed around Garth, being remodelled and added to, over the last 50 years.

Garth's main focus at present is working in Vapour Recovery equipment. It involves captivating the vapour from a car fuel tank, during refilling, before it enters the atmosphere, then metering the vapour and retaining it. And like most of Garth's

work, it's commercially sensitive.

He has seen company communications improve from a shared memo on a piece of paper on your desk's in and out trays, to today's instant computer contact, internally and externally. The first administration System 36 Computer commissioned, filled an entire room. Then faxes came along and communication progressed from there.

> "We used to have to go the to the Marton Railway Station which had its own Telex machine to send a message and it took 24 hours to get a reply on a paper tape." Progressing from a toolmaker to high tech designer took a lot of investigation and research, "Research material had to be sourced from the USA. We ordered magazines to study. You couldn't look up the internet, as it didn't exist."

Gallagher has built a proud reputation for innovation and quality and Garth is big part of that. The company currently carries out many specialised and intricate contacts for the high technology New Zealand Businesses. Now,75 percent of what the company produces is sold overseas.

Garth was surprised by a company presentation and party last Wednesday to honour his 50 year service.

He watched congatulatory videos from work mates, contractors and company offices all over the world, along with Sir William Gallagher, the owner of the Gallagher Group. Garth was also thrilled by the arrival of his two sons who were flown in from Australia to join him along with his daughter who lives locally. It was an emotional event for him as he at Production Engineering Ltd, now recently lost his wife Christine to cancer Gallagher. Reg Williams commissioned but he was thrilled his family were by the Maori carving seen in the his side.

He says, "There has been a great bunch people throughout my career. I've been

supported by a lot of people who have helped me, trained me and become good Friends. There is still a great bunch of enthusiastic people working here today who support both myself and the

company." He says he has a couple of years working still left in him, but he is looking towards a future in retirement.

White Ribbon Riders joining market day

Anti-violence organisations are calling for local men to stand up and join the White Ribbon Riders when they roll into Marton on Saturday 24 November.

The White Ribbon Ride will attend the Marton Market Day Two riders and the local mayor will address the crowd and there will be an opportunity for people to ask questions and see the motorbikes. The riders will arrive at 9.30am and depart at 11.30am for the next stop on their ride down the NI. The White Ribbon Ride is part of November's White Ribbon campaign, raising awareness and support to end men's violence towards women. This year, the campaign is focusing on getting men to stand up and get involved by taking The Pledge.

White Ribbon manager Rob McCann explains, 'White Ribbon wants men to take The Pledge, which means getting men taking real action. To take The Pledge online, men will have to choose between one of eight actions to listen, reflect, alter their behaviour, talk to others and disrupt negative behaviour - all of which build respectful behaviour that undermines violence.

The ride began in 2009 and now reaches over 80 communities in November and will pass through Marton on a motorcycle ride that covers thousands of kilometres. Anyone can join the ride, providing they have a current licence, a warranted bike with a minimum engine size of 250cc and is willing to make the pledge never to commit, condone or remain silent about violence towards women. Local riders are also welcome.



RANK CALIFICATION OF THE RURAL Focus on farming and the land

Ōroua River recognised at NZ River Awards

Horizons Regional Council councillor Colleen Sheldon accepted a NZ River Award on Tuesday night for the Oroua River.

The awards celebrate waterways showing long-term trend improvements in water quality. A panel of NZ scientists judged the awards using long-term data stored on the Land Air Water Aotearoa (LAWA) website - www.lawa.org.nz.

This year's awards focussed on dissolved reactive phosphorus (DRP) improvements. The Oroua River was the most improved in the Horizons Region and second most improved nationally, with a 13.3 percent improvement. Other water quality indicators including total nitrogen, E.coli, and turbidity are also improving at this site, while the MCI state is fair, with a score of 95. This is the second 'most improved' award for the Ōroua since 2014 - for improving DRP trends.

Horizons natural resources and partnerships group manager Dr Jon Roygard says the site is part of the regional council's extensive monitoring programme that measures water quality parameters upstream and downstream of major point discharge sources throughout the region."The improved DRP levels are a great result.

Manawatū District Council has significantly invested in upgrading their wastewater treatment plant over time. "Partial funding has also come from central government through the Manawatū River Leaders' Accord's Fresh Start for Freshwater Clean-up project." Upgrade works included the reconstruction of existing ponds and the addition of clarification units, ongoing alum dosing to remove phosphorus and residual suspended solids and enhancing the standard of disinfection achieved by the UV disinfection system. This summer the plant has begun irrigating all treated wastewater to land for six months of the year while the Oroua River levels are low




