### Who Shot Thebarman wins Sydney Cup

Locally owned NZ horse Who Shot Thebarman had a thrilling finish to win the \$2.1 million Sydney Cup on Saturday. O'Leary family members, who own the horse, were there to witness the win. Only Shaun's wife was missing.

Dan O'Leary says "It was huge thrill. It was a very close race, with just a nose in it. The horse has finished second twice in the race, so it was great to finally get its first Group 1 win in Australia." Dan says the family's still on cloud nine. Last weekend's win takes Who Shot Thebarman's winnings

to \$5 million.

Saturday's cup winning jockey was JB Shinn, while the O'Learys' horse was trained by leading Australian trainer Chris Waller, who formerly trained in Foxton. The nine year gelding is out for spell now but could return to race in the Melbourne Cup next November.

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### Value of Opp Shop



Marton Christian Welfare Council runs the Opp Shop inMarton and has a proud history of giving to the community. It was founded in 1968 and continues to carry out its valuable work to this day.

Ted Calkin, who was elected as mayor of Marton Borough in 1963, had frequent calls on his "Mayoral relief Fund" and was aware that there was some doubling up with other agencies and service organisations and churches.

Betty Corballis approached the mayor, expressing an interest in welfare work in the local community. So, along with Clifford Brown, then Methodist minister, the three initiated a committee comprising "the stalwarts" (Ted Calkin's term) of Ruth Barry, Albert Guddopp, Masie Fenton along with the three originals. The constitution was based on the Methodist Mission's constitution (in Christchurch).

Marton Christian Welfare Council was officially founded in 1968. Its makeup comprised two members from each church congregation in Marton and one member from each service club or organisation and the current presidents of Red Cross and Marton service clubs. Originally ministers attended the meetings as one of their church reps. The makeup of the Council remains the same today.

In 1976, the Council was made an incorporated society and continues to be guided by the original constitution. They founded the Marton Opportunity Shop, first started in Broadway. The Council, was also responsible for setting up the Edale Trust Board which established Edale Rest Home - the work of the first executive committee. Over the years, Edale has received considerable support from the Opp Shop and Council's work.

In 1992, they purchased premises at 5 Follett St in Marton but unfortunately, in March 2010 the building was gutted by fire. They were fortunate to be able to continue business in temporary premises in the former Farmlands building in High St. They rebuilt the premises in 5 Follett St and re-opened

in February 2012. The Opp Shop is run entirely by over 35 volunteers who contribute many hours of work.

Marton Christian Welfare chair Robert Wilson says, "The support from the district is outstanding and means that all profits made from the sale of goods is put into helping with the welfare needs of Marton and district. Marton Christian Welfare supports local schools, church welfare and provides parcels and other emergency relief for the community including Milo for Schools and the annual Community Christmas Dinner. They also appreciate the opportunity to work with all the agencies that help meet the needs in the Marton community."

### **Guests at Taihape Music** Group

Taihape Music Group welcomes husband-andwife performers Colin Decio and Ingrid Prosser for a programme of classical piano music and poetry on Sunday 22 April. Concert pianist Colin Decio hails from the UK, though he owes his surname to his Iranian father. Colin has a special affinity for the Russian repertoire, and the programme includes four Rakhmaninov Preludes, and Prokofiev's 9th Sonata. He will also play Haydn's Sonata no. 59 in E Flat, and Ravel's Alborado del Gracioso. The music will be interspersed with poetry from performance poet Ingrid Prosser. Shakespeare Sonnets will entwine around Rakhmaninov Preludes, and in the second half of the programme, Tennyson's The Lady of Shalott will take us from Prokofiev to Ravel. Ingrid will also include some of her own poetry. Primarily a nature poet, she likes to make a seasonal offering, so her poems on this occasion will be autumnal. Colin and Ingrid have for the last 18 months made their home in Wellington. After 16 years in the UK, it



### What is the Long Term Plan?

The Long Term Plan (LTP) describes our Council's priorities, key projects and activities for the next 10 years. The LTP is reviewed every three years and the community are asked to provide comments on this Plan through a consultation document called "Unfolding the Plan".

### What's in the Consultation Document?

Unfolding the Plan summarises what's in the LTP, it outlines where your rates are spent and what services Council provides. It also tells you what we think are the important issues that the District faces over the next 10 years. Most importantly it provides you with the opportunity to give us your feedback on key choices.

### I. Rubbish and Recycling in the urban areas of Ratana, Koitiata, Scotts Ferry, Bulls, Marton, Hunterville, Taihape and Mangaweka

Currently urban rubbish collection across our District is via a commercial arrangement between residents and waste management companies, and the Council has no involvement in this service. The Council wants to know if urban residents in Ratana, Scotts Ferry, Koitiata, Bulls, Marton, Hunterville, Mangaweka and Taihape want a Council operated kerbside recycling service; or a Council operated kerbside recycling and rubbish collection service – that would replace the commercial rubbish collection operation currently in place.

The implementation of a kerbside recycling service could potentially reduce the amount of rubbish to be disposed of. Items that can be recycled instead of being put into the rubbish include:

- Glass bottles and jars
- Tins and aluminium cans
- Plastic containers with number triangle 1-6
  Paper and conducted

Paper and cardboard

Currently, green waste is excluded from this service.

The cost for a kerbside recycling and/or rubbish service in the urban areas of Ratana, Scotts Ferry, Koitiata, Bulls, Marton, Hunterville, Mangaweka and Taihape would be charged via a targeted rate to residents in those areas.

### THE OPTIONS ARE:

### Council's Preferred Option

### **ONE.** Provision of a Council recycling service only

All urban properties to be supplied with 240 litre wheelie bin (for cardboard, plastic, cans) and a 45 litre crate (for glass bottles) which would be collected fortnightly. This option would mean residents no longer needed to make trips to the waste transfer station to do their recycling (except to dispose of green waste) and should lead to increased recycling and decreased rubbish to landfill. It would maintain the present system of choice to residents for disposing of rubbish and the recycling facilities will be available at the waste transfer stations.

### Likely consequences:

### On rates

\$498,545 annual rates requirement from 2019/20 is included in the budget projections. This would be raised by a targeted rate for urban property owners in Ratana, Scotts Ferry, Koitiata, Bulls, Marton, Hunterville, Mangaweka and Taihape:

### 2018/19 Nil

2019/20

\$106 each separately used or inhabited property in the specified urban areas. This will be a new targeted solid waste rate.

### **TWO.** Provision of a rubbish and recycling service

### One wheelie bin and one crate issued per household (for recycling); and rubbish collection

This option would see a weekly rubbish collection service and households would be issued with one wheelie bin for recycling (collected fortnightly) and one crate for glass (collected fortnightly) and would dispense with the need for residents to make trips to the waste transfer station to recycle (except to dispose of green waste) and probably lead to increased recycling and decreased rubbish to landfill.

### Likely consequences:

### On rates

\$777,157 annual rates requirement. This would be raised by a targeted rate for urban property owners in Ratana, Scotts Ferry, Koitiata, Bulls, Marton, Hunterville, Mangaweka and Taihape:

### 2018/19 Nil

**2019/20** \$165 each separately used or inhabited property in the specified urban areas (i.e. an additional \$55 over the cost of recycling only).

### THREE. Retain the status quo

No Council operated rubbish or recycling service. This would mean residents continue to make their own arrangements for kerbside rubbish collection and how they recycle.

### Likely consequences

#### **On rates**

2018/19 No change

2019/20

No change, but \$106 reduction from projections included in this plan for each separately used or inhabited property in Ratana, Scotts Ferry, Koitiata, Bulls, Marton, Hunterville, Mangaweka and Taihape

The costs for the various options are estimates only. If Council decides, having considered submissions, to provide a recycling; or recycling and rubbish service, tenders would be called which will establish firm prices. The delivery of such a service (and the cost) would be confirmed through the 2019/20 Annual Plan and if agreed to would start on 1 July 2019.

### 2. Economic Development

Increasing economic growth is important for improving the quality of life for residents in the Rangitikei. Therefore we have committed \$200,000 for each of the next 10 years and we want to know what you think of five areas Council considers could be effective to do this, they are: promotion; expanding markets; facilitation; labour planning; and incentivising growth. Council does not have a preferred option, we want to know what you think would be the most worthwhile use of these funds. Full details on each of the five areas are on pages 8 and 9 of our Consultation Document.

## 3. Voluntary targeted rate for ceiling and underfloor insulation

Local Authorities can provide a scheme to help ratepayers who are unable to cover the full cost of insulation or are not eligible for an EECA grant. This would be via a voluntary targeted rate specifically for home insulation for low income families. Council does not have a preferred option and this is not included in the budgets as there are no net costs to ratepayers. The scheme would be optional. To qualify ratepayers must be up-to-date with their rate payments, have a good payment history and use an approved installer of insulation. The maximum sum made available to a ratepayer would be \$5,000 for a term of up to 9 years at an interest rate of 7%. Full details are on page 9 of our Consultation Document.

### Council's Infrastructure and Financial Strategy

Infrastructure accounts for over 80% of Council's operating expenditure and virtually all of Council's capital expenditure. The Strategy outlines:

- the key infrastructural service issues the Rangitikei community must address over the next 30 years;
- the main options for dealing with those issues;
- the cost and service delivery implications for residents and businesses of those options, including the impact of increased debt; and
- the Council's current preferred scenario for infrastructure provision.


### Factors of critical importance in the strategy are:


- the projected changes in population in different parts of the District;
- the adequacy of government funding assistance for roads;
- the conditions governing resource consents for water, wastewater and (potentially) stormwater;
- Government's decisions on the findings from the Havelock North inquiry into potable water supplies;
- the affordability of maintaining current urban reticulation and treatment systems (and the ability to secure government financial assistance);
- the affordability of new fit-forpurpose civic/ community centres in Bulls, Marton and Taihape to replace earthquake-prone and outmoded facilities;
- the capacity (within the organisation and of contractors) to deliver the proposed capital programme within the projected times;


- knowledge of the condition and performance of the assets; and
- the sustainable level of debt.
- This Strategy considers the most likely scenarios for our significant infrastructure-related decisions over the next 30 years, including projects for wastewater plant upgrades and civic (town) centre redevelopment in the next 10 years. It also covers projects beyond that timeframe such as the Hunterville wastewater upgrades, for which the current consent expires in 2037.
- The size of the District, the scattered nature of urban areas and uncertainty about population changes mean there are some significant challenges for the Council to manage. These challenges include our ability to continue to deliver quality services that are affordable, so Council will be advocating strongly to the Government for funding assistance.


### Average rate increase

The proposed average annual rate increase in the LTP is less than 4% even though Council has some major projects coming up. The total planned expenditure on capital projects, over the next 10 years, is \$174 million. Our wastewater plants in Bulls, Marton, Ratana and Taihape need to be upgraded, which is essential for these communities. The Mangaweka Bridge is programmed to be replaced over the next three years too, this is a joint project with Manawatu District Council and the New Zealand Transport Agency. Redevelopment of community/civic facilities in Marton, Bulls and Taihape are also planned over the term of the LTP.
