A driver's licence gives you freedom and more choice. It's also another valuable life tool for Rangititkei College senior students as they prepare to enter the adult world.

The College's Driver Licensing Programme resumed in June this year, following a successful pilot programme last year which which saw up to 16 students gain their learner license through the programme.

Funded by Marton Lions and in conjunction with AA, the driver licensing programme takes Year 12/13 students (normally from no licence) and guides them through the stages of learner's or restricted licences and eventually on to a full licence. The programme is fully funded by a donation from the JBS Dudding Trust, in conjunction with AA and manned by Marton

According to Mr Kingi, the students have grown in confidence since starting driving lessons. So far this year, seven students have earned their learner licence part of being 'work ready' which qualifies them for three and sends our students out



Last week National's Finance spokesperson, Amy Adams was in Palmerston North. Amongst other things, she hosted a morning tea which was attended by around 50 people. She talked about the economy, her concerns about where it's heading and the fact the Labour -NZ First- Green coalition seems to have its head in the sand when it comes to their anti-growth policies and the effect they're having on business confidence and the economy.

Amy Adams' commentary was both interesting and insightful. She pointed out that since this Government took office, GDP per capita has slowed down considerably; growth forecasts have been downgraded by all the major banks and economic agencies; job growth has fallen by 60 percent and, in the last three months, 4000 more people have joined the ranks of the unemployed. At the same time, an increase in the cost of living is hitting our poorest and most vulnerable hard.

There are new taxes too and even more on the horizon and there's an air of uncertainty – about industrial relations changes, immigration settings, shutting down the oil and gas industry, labour capacity constraints and banning foreign investment. On top of all this, economic growth is slowing down, because when businesses are uncertain and not willing to invest or hire new workers, GDP growth slows down. The fact it's tracking below Government forecasts is a very real concern, as every one percent drop in GDP growth equates to around \$800m less that the Government has to spend each year. So when GDP growth slows down, Kiwis miss out on higher wag-es and better living standards.

Amy Adams pointed out that National, on the other hand, believes in sensible, consistent economic policies that encourage businesses to grow - because a growing economy means more jobs and higher incomes. It also means increased revenue, so Government can pay for the first world education, health, welfare and public services that New Zealanders deserve and have come to expect.

New Zealand should be a place where everyone has the opportunity to get ahead. We need the right incentives to encourage productive work, savings and investment. National believes it's important to keep costs on households low and to ensure Government spending is both high quality and linked to clear, reported results. We should live within our means. National also backs competitive enterprise and reward for achievement, while at the same time supporting sustainable development of our natural resources. We also believe in the potential of New Zealanders to compete in the world and

With real economic indicators now showing the economy

is beginning to stall and opportunities for New Zealanders are beginning to dry up, this Government needs to drop its anti-growth poli-cies, which are clearly damaging the New Zealand economy. The Coalition inherited a strong platform, with business confidence on the up, large and growing surpluses and record terms of trade. What a difference a year makes!

The real harm is that we're talking about the health, welfare, wellbeing and prosperity of real Kiwis and real Kiwi businesses and it doesn't look good when the economic indicators are all

Taihape Music Group will present a piano recital by the outstanding New Zealand pianist Richard Mapp (pictured), on Wednesday September 5. Richard is touring New Zealand for Chamber Music New Zealand, with concerts from Kerikeri in the north to Cromwell and Gore in the south.

He has toured many times for Chamber Music New Zealand and has performed with major orchestras and the NZ String Quartet. He has recently recorded 6 CDs and is frequently heard on RNZ Concert.

After study at Canterbury & Otago Universities, with Maurice Till, he studied at the Royal Academy of Music, London, where he later held a teaching fellowship. While based in London and Italy, he per-formed widely in Europe, gave recitals at the Wigmore Hall and recorded for BBC Radio3.

In 1991 he returned to New Zealand to live initially in the Far North, where he co-founded the Bay of Islands Arts Festival. From 2000 to 2010 he was senior lecturer at the Massey Conservatorium in Wellington, and is now an Artist Teacher at the School of Music. He has enjoyed deputising at the Universi-ties of Canterbury and Waikato and is an experienced adjudicator and dedicated teacher.

Richard Mapp's Taihape concert on 5 September begins at 7.30pm and will be held at the Women's Club, Tui St. The programme includes music by Bach, Schubert, Chopin and Brahms. Admission at the door is adults \$25, members \$20 and children \$5. Supper will be served.






