Council Roundup November

The Bulls Community Centre is moving forward, with excavation on the site likely to start at the end of this week.

The site of the Marton A dam on Tutaenui Rd, which is no longer needed, will soon be put

Council approved establishing a Youth Council for the District, to get input from young residents about Council decisions, as well as giving them the opportunity to learn governance and leadership skills. The Youth Council will be rised of residents 13-24 years old and members will be selected, not elected.

Council moves on kerbside recycling

Rangitikei District councillors have voted to investigate the possibility of providing a kerbside recycling service for the District's urban residents.

Over half those who responded to the recent consultation favoured either a recycling or a rubbish and recycling service in the main towns.

A recent public consultation asked residents whether they would like Council to provide a kerbside recycling, or rubbish and recycling, service in the urban areas or stick with the current practise of residents take their recycling to transfer stations.

There were 541 responses in favour of a recycling or rubbish and recycling service, and 431 in favour of the current set-up. Council voted to ask for expressions of interest from providers to set up either a kerbside recycling service or a recycling and rubbish service.

There was some resistance from councillors to the idea, mainly on the basis that it would lead to an increase in rates. However, it was also pointed out that making kerbside recycling available would potentially lead to an overall reduction in cost for many, as they wouldn't have to buy as many rubbish bags.

Cr Angus Gordon also pointed out that "it's the right thing to do," likening it to making sure we treat and dispose of our sewage properly. He was also concerned that the current system, which relies on residents taking their recycling to transfer stations, caused problems for those who don't have access to transport, including the elderly and those on restricted incomes.

Council will now seek expressions of interest from companies that could provide the service. Those expressions of interest will include the cost of providing the service and Council will then decide whether it is a service that can be affordable for residents.

Council Confirms Contractors for Bulls Community Centre

W&W Construction Ltd of Whanganui has been confirmed by the Rangitikei District Council as the contractor to build the new Bulls Community Centre.

Construction will start in early December and the build is expected to take around 12 months - a great Christmas present to locals in 2019!

The Centre will house a new town hall, library and information centre, town square, carpark and bus interchange.

Mayor Andy Watson said it's a result of a lot of hard work by a dedicated team (staff and elected members) who wanted to see this project become a reality.

He added that it's been a long three years to get to this point and the community has every right to be proud of getting the project up and running and seeing it to fruition. Mayor Watson says the facility is likely to become an icon of Bulls and the Rangitikei and sets the bar very high for other town developments in the Rangitikei.

The first sod was turned on Wednesday at on the site of the new Bulls Community Centre and an announcement was made that a new motel will also be built on the site.

Plenty of support for Bulls house project

The Bulls Community Centre local fundraising group is refurbishing a home in Walton St and the proceeds of its sale will go towards the local fundraising contribution of the project from the Bulls community- a perquisite of the new centre being built.

The idea of doing up a house to sell came from Lyndon Tamblyn. He approached Mike O'Byrne from Central House Movers who rained his generosity on the project.

Mike donated a \$40,000 house, had it professionally painted, with paint donated by Guthrie Bowron Whanganui and moved to it onto the site, free of charge and will provide a relocated garage to finish it off.

Rangitikei District Council donated the section which is at the end the Walton St culdu- sac with rural view. Some very charitable trade Bulls tradespeople have offered their time under the watchful eye of project manager Merv Connelly who is also a volunteer. A crew from Ohakea Airbase is also in on the interior demolition. Dozens of their staff have already spent time at the site with more to come.

Builder Matt Holden has already spent hours renovating the house which is three bedrooms with a good layout suitable for a family. Hogget Doughty Contractors prepared the site. APB Electrical has provided electrical work. Micro Plumbing is providing a new bathroom, Kitchen Allsorts is providing a kitchen at a low cost including the rangehood. Bulls plumber Braden Hammond is doing plumbing work and others like Annabel Sidey have carried out work. Gibstopping, painting and decorating will follow. Anyone with interior decorating expertise is welcome to join in. There are still front and back decks to be built on too. The group is in search of a sponsor for the concrete laying.

The group plans to auction the property before winter 2019. Bronyn Meads says, "There is still quite a bit to be done. We have aimed the house at the first home buyer market leaving some work for the buyer to add their own touches. The community contribution is already over \$100,000 and the money raised by the

sale of house will raise it considerably.'

Mayor Andy Watson has been very supportive of the house project. He says, "We broke ground to start the **Bulls Community Centre** project on Wednesday with building contractors, W & W Construction Ltd who are undertaking the work. The site was blessed by iwi and archaeologists will be on site in case anything of historical value is uncovered.

I am thrilled we are at the thick end of the project after three years. The house sale will more than double the amount from

So, let's celebrate Christmas, but please let us make sure we tell the whole story.





Fire Brigade prize winner to learn about firefighting



Lea Godden was the lucky winner of a prize draw the Marton Fire Brigade ran at the Marton Market Day. Station Officer Kevin Darling presented the hamper to Lea, a teacher at Rangitikei College who lives in Marton and who had put her name on a signup sheet to find out more about becoming a firefighter, which put her into the draw.

Lea was keen to find out about the Marton Fire Brigade and volunteering.

Kevin says the Marton Brigade needs extra people. "We really want to focus on new people joining us. There is a range of jobs people can use their particular skills to support the brigade - from firefighting and computer work to station support"

He says something the brigade also wants to focus on is home fire safety."Marton is performing poorly in the structure fire area so we want to focus on local home safety." About 269 people signed up at market day and, of those, 96 requested a home safety visit from us - 47 from Marton. "We only did 3 last year, so there is a need."

Kevin says, "If you want someone to come to your house and advise you how to keep fire safe - talk to someone from the brigade, ring the Marton Fire Station or talk to Kevin Darling.

"We are trying to reach out and visibly help the community in Marton which might also lead to more members."

The Marton Fire Birigade meets every Monday evening.

Chorus contactors are around Marton digging up grass verges laying the fibre cables for UFB in the Rangitikei. Marton was chosen as an area for early rollout of UFB which will make Marton business competitive nationally and internationally, with faster internet connections.

Recently, Chorus told the Rangitikei District Monitor, "The Marton Ultra Fast Broadband (UFB) Build has started with five of our sixteen build areas under action. Two of these are nearing completion for handover that will allow customers

RANGITĪKEILINE BULLETIN

Results from Recycling and Rubbish Consultation

974 responses were received to the survey postcard asking for views on Council providing a kerbside rubbish and/or recycling service in the urban centres - i.e. nearly 25% of all households replied, showing the strong interest in this topic by the community. However, views in the survey responses were very mixed - 541 (56%) wanted Council to provide recycling or rubbish and recycling and 433 (44%) did not.

After considerable debate at its meeting on 30 November 2018, Council resolved to consider introducing a fortnightly kerbside recycling and weekly rubbish collection service in Bulls, Marton, Hunterville, Mangaweka and Taihape and seek Expressions of Interest to assess the interest in the market and to get an indicative price for providing this service. While the submissions from Ratana showed no interest in a Council providing a rubbish/ recycling service, consideration is being given to how this could be feasible for Turakina and Koitiata.

Youth Council

Also on 30 November 2018. Council decided to establish a Rangitīkei Youth Council, with an annual contribution of \$10,000 to be included in the 2019/20 Annual Plan. The Council will comprise 11 youth aged 13-24 years old - they will be selected by an interview panel made up of members of the Council's policy team, the Councillor holding the youth portfolio, and a representative nominated by Te Roopu Ahi Kaa. Applications are now open. The selection process will take place in February.

New Bulls Community Centre

Council has decided that Contract 1084 for constructing the new Bulls Community Centre in Criterion Street will be awarded to W & W Construction 2010 Ltd (a Whanganuibased firm) for the sum of up to \$5,348,837 (GST exclusive). Site works will begin in December, following a blessing and ground-breaking ceremony. Initial excavation will be supervised by an archaeologist – a legal requirement because there was human activity on this site prior to 1900. The target completion date is the end of December

Council appreciates and acknowledges the generous local support given to this project, not only in terms of donations but also in helping in various ways, with the relocated house project in Walton Street (provided by Central House Movers), which will be sold next year to help with the costs of the project.

New Amenities for Taihape Memorial Park

After further local discussions in Taihape, Council has formally confirmed its intention to build a new amenities block on Taihape Memorial Park on the site beside the No. 3 Field. This will allow Clubs Taihape to build its planned facility close by, making sharing of both much more feasible. The historic grandstand will remain as now, apart from some minor work. Council has acknowledged, however, that there will be earthquake-strengthening needed by 2027.

Restoration of South African War Memorial in Marton Park

The South African War memorial in Marton Park, which honours trooper George Hyde, the return to peace after the Boer War and the coronation of Edward VII (who succeeded Queen Victoria), needs skilled restoration work. Council has agreed to contribute \$12,618, a third of the estimated cost of the work, which includes restoration of lighting.

New toilets - Mangaweka Village and Queens Park, Hunterville

After consideration of several sites in Mangaweka Village, Council accepted the invitation from the previous owners of Papa Cliff Café to place the new toilet in its carpark. Installation was completed at the end of November. Also completed was a new toilet at the north end of Queen's Park, Hunterville, together with a compacting rubbish bin and drinking fountain. Most of the cost of these two facilities came from the Government's Tourism Infrastructure Funding schemes.

Events Sponsorship Grants

Council's Finance/Performance Committee recently approved ten grants from the Events Sponsorship Scheme. They include the New Zealand Boot-throwing Association, which is organising the World boot-throwing championships in Taihape in March 2019, the Rangitīkei Shearing Sports, the Artful Christmas Bonanza organised by the Marton Arts and Crafts Centre and the Taihape Older and Bolder 'You Day'.



Update on abnormal El Niño

An abnormal El Niño weather event is looking likely for NZ over summer, according to NIWA meteorologist Ben Noll. In the latest update about the potential for an El Niño system, which NIWA has been keeping a watch on for several months, Mr Noll said there was now an 80 per cent chance it will happen.

"El Niño conditions have still yet to officially arrive but the Pacific Ocean continues to make strides towards it," he said. This particular El Niño is likely to start late and is exhibiting some non-traditional characteristics in the ocean.

"The most unusually warm sea surface temperatures are in the central equatorial Pacific – typ-ically they are found further east, closer to South America."



Mr Noll said this was known as a central-based El Niño, or El Niño Modoki.

Modoki is a Japanese word that means "same, but different". Impacts from this El Niño are likely to deviate from those experienced during a conventional event.

During summer, in a typical El Niño, New Zealand has stronger and/or more frequent winds from the west, leading to an elevated risk of drier-than-normal conditions in the east of both islands and above normal rainfall in the west.

This year and into next year, while westerly air flow patterns are favoured, the summer season may come with a bit more variability. El Niño Modoki may be associated with periodic easterly-quarter wind flows that bring some beneficial rainfall

to eastern areas.

The next three months is equally likely to have above average, or average temperatures, for all regions of New Zealand, with rainfall below normal, or near normal for most areas, Mr Noll said. There are several regions identified by NIWA that should be monitored closely for developing dry conditions this summer season, including: the lower/ western South Island, Gisborne/East Cape, Bay of Plenty, Coromandel/Waikato, Auckland, and Northland.

While El Niño can be confined to summer, the chance for this to carry on into autumn is elevated and stands at 55 to 60 percent.

NIWA outlook: December 2018 – February 2019. Central North Island, Taranaki, Whanganui, Manawatu, Wellington. Temperatures are about equally likely to be above average (45% chance) or near average (40% chance). Rainfall totals are mostly likely to be in the near normal range (45% chance).

Soil moisture levels and river flows are most likely to be in the near normal range (40-45% chance).

Embraces Te Rā Mokopuna - Safe Sleep Day with WDHB.

'Make every sleep a safe sleep' - that's the message Whanganui District Health Board is urging families of young children to take on board to avoid the risks associated with Sudden Unexpected Death in Infancy (SUDI).

It is Te Rā Mokopuna National Safe Sleep Day on Friday 7 December aimed atraising awareness about SUDI and encourage families with new-borns or babies-to-be to use safe sleep devices such as woven wahukura and Pepi-pods, which babies can be safely placed in for sleeping.

WDHB public health nurse Marianne Vine says SUDI caused by unintentional suffocation is preventable, and risks for babies can be significantly reduced when the rights steps are put in place.

"While smoking and bed sharing are major risk factors leading to sudden unexpected death in infancy, we'd also urge mothers and families to think about safe clothing and bedding choices for their babies. The importance of babies and infants having clothing and blankets that can breathe, for example cotton and wool, is vital to preventing overheating which can lead to SUDI. This age group cannot regulate their body heat, which makes them among the most vulnerable."

Mrs Vine says popular polar fleece and mink blankets are not OK for babies or infants. "Easy wash merino wraps are popular and are perfect for babies. The 'PEPE' framework is a simple guideline for SUDI prevention:

PLACE baby in their own bed for every sleep (and close to

parents/caregivers at night).
ELIMINATE smoking in pregnancy, in the whānau and in

the home.

POSITION baby on their back for sleep.

ENCOURAGE and support Mum, so baby is breastfed.

It's a message supported by WRHN safe sleep coordinator Angela Weekly, who welcomes calls from people wanting a Pepi-Pod or wahakura.

"In NZ, SUDI is the main cause of death for children aged between one month and one year. SUDI kills 40 to 50 babies a year. Risks of SUDI are higher for premature babies born before 37 weeks gestation; babies with low birth weight - lower than 2500 grams; babies of teenage mothers; babies of Māori and Pacific Island families; babies of mothers on medication which can lead to drowsiness; babies who have been exposed to smoking during pregnancy; and babies exposed to regular alcohol, smoking and/or other drug use in the household.

If you - or a hapū (pregnant) woman you know has one or more of these risk factors, you may be eligible for a free Pepi-Pod or wahakura. Virtues of feeding a horse at ground level

Horses are grazers by nature and have evolved to forage throughout the day at ground level.

Their teeth are designed to wear most evenly when lowering the head, to grasp food and chew. As the horse lowers his head, his bottom jaw moves forward; placing the teeth into proper alignment. This therefore reduces the development of hooks and ramps, as the teeth get more even wear.

Feeding the horse at ground level is also beneficial to your horse's respiratory health. When a horse is pulling hay out of raised hay rack/nets it has a much greater chance of inhaling dust particles.

A lower, stretched out neck is more open at the jaw. This open airway, with the help of gravity, enables drainage out of the nostrils.

Another benefit is that it stretches out the neck and back muscles that are often tight from work. Many riders spend a large part of their training developing and stretching these muscles under tack. Some people are reluctant to feed at ground level, due to the increased feed waste. However, due to the above health benefits, the horse's natural way of eating should be considered when designing stables/yards and feeding out.







About Garden Mulch

As summer is now around the corner, it's a good time to be thinking about getting outdoors and into the garden.

In nature, the forest floor is covered with leaves, sticks and branches for most of the year. Using tree mulch on your garden beds or landscape mimics this process and protects the soil from harsh seasons, by regulating the soil temperature.

Arboriculture woodchip contains wood and bark in a range of sizes and pieces. The variation in size benefits the soil by allowing water to infiltrate through, creating a knitted barrier between the soil and the environment. This means that it is particularly useful for large landscaping projects and for use on exposed or sloping sites.

Wood chip, sawdust, and woodshavings are not composted, so must be laid on top of the soil and never dug in until they have rotted. This is to avoid them depleting the soil of nitrogen as they break down.

Tips for mulching...

- 1. Weed the ground first.
- 2. Put down a layer of newspaper as a base.
- 3. Use a good thick layer of mulch (this will keep the weeds at bay).
- 4. Try to keep the stem of plants free, ensuring air flow around the base of the plant.
- 5. Keep mulch away from tree trunks to prevent rotting.
- 6. Mulch will settle once spread (so expect to have to top it up periodically).

Wood mulch is an economical and readily available product, that is easy to apply and remove. Whilst also benefiting the soil, mulch adds texture to a landscape enhancing the visual appearance of a space.

FLOW CHANGES IN THE MOAWHANGO AND RANGITIKEI RIVERS

Genesis Energy's resource consents for the Tongariro Power Scheme require flushing flow releases from Moawhango Dam. This release is the first of five releases for the summer of 2018-2019. The purpose of the flushing flow is to help improve the ecology of the Moawhango River. SWIMMABILITY TARGETS PROPOSED FOR HORIZONS REGION

Horizons Regional Council has set its swimmability targets for the region's large rivers and lakes (suitable for swimming year-round) to 70 per cent by 2030 and 80 per cent by 2040. For summer, when most people swim, Council has set a target of 90 per cent by 2040. The Council's aspirations follow a 2017 amendment to the National Policy Statement for Freshwater Management (NPS-FM), directing all regional councils to set targets to improve the quality of fresh water. The NPS-FM sets specific definitions of fourth-order rivers and larger, as weel as lakes, with a perimeter of at least 1.5km, for the targets. Horizons chair Bruce Gordon says modelling for the Ministry for the Environment estimates work already planned will see the length of rivers in the region suitable for swimming increase from 43 per cent to 60 per cent over the 12 years to 2030. "While this modelling does not take into account factors such as climate change, economic or social drivers, or future changes to policy, Council has agreed to aspire to higher targets of 70 per cent by 2030 and 80 per cent by 2040," says Cr Gordon. "Horizons' targets will contribute to national targets of 80 per cent by 2030 and 90 per cent by 2040. "Council is aware that significant investment will be needed to meet targets higher than the current modelling predictions. However, we recognise that our communities aspire to better water

quality and have set ourselves ambitious targets. While our region is currently below the national average for swimmability, we are seeing a faster than average improvement," says Cr Gordon. "Our Sustainable Land Use Initiative (SLUI) that targets erosion prone hill country and our freshwater programme that assists farmers and community groups with fencing and planting, are beginning to make a difference. Further interventions and their associated costs are yet to be explored. However, we already know that taking a planned, whole of catchment approach and prioritising effort and investment where it would make the most difference works. Council is already reviewing its approach to freshwater. This includes proposed One Plan changes Additionally, Horizons' non-regulatory work programmes, the commitment from our territorial authorities to upgrade wastewater treatment plants and manage stormwater better, landowner's investment in environmental improvements, and efforts of community groups will all contribute to improved outcomes for swimmability and overall water quality." Horizons natural resources and partnership group manager Dr Jon Roygard says that in 2016, Council upgraded its swim spot monitoring programme from 17 swim spots to 83 throughout the region. "From early November, until the end of April, samples are taken from these sites on a weekly basis and sent to an independent and accredited laboratory for testing. They are tested for faecal indicato bacteria, including E. coli (for freshwater) and Enterococci (for coastal waters). Our scientists also check each site for phormidium, known as potential toxic algae or cyanobacteria," says Dr Roygard. "The bacteria and cyanobacteria results are made available to the public on Horizons and Land Air Water Aotearoa (LAWA) websites, so they can make an informed choice about when and where to swim in our region. In addition to our swim spot monitoring programme, Horizons monitors water quality from sites across the region on a monthly basis. Water collected from these sites is tested for levels of nutrient, bacteria and sediment as well as for clarity and pyshico-chemical stressors, such as pH and temperature. We also have a network that measures some aspects of water quality on a continuous basis (every 15 minutes). All of this data helps us to make informed decisions about what work programmes we need to prioritise and implement to help improve water quality in our region. An independent report conducted by LWP Ltd, earlier this year, showed strong evidence of regional improvement in sediment and E.coli measures. These improvements have been linked to interventions to improve, or remove point source discharges to water and land management interventions such as the work with SLUI, New Zealand's largest hill country erosion management programme. However a further report by LWP for Horizons on river water quality state and trend analysis for the region indicates coli concentrations generally do not meet bathing suitability guidelines for the One Plan, or the National Objectives Framework. These results are consistent with the swimmability statistics for the region. A furthe finding was that, within the overall regional improving trends, some sites are showing declining trends. This further confirms that there is still work to do to improve the swimmability of the region's rivers. A next step will be to plan and undertake actions to achieve the new targets that Council has adopted," says Dr Roygard.

Cards title defended

Symptoms of Heavy Digital Device Use on the Rise among Generation X

Lack of awareness and vanity are the two main reasons Kiwis don't seek treatment for an agerelated vision condition, with Generation X being the worst offenders, according to experts.

Optometrists are warning that prolonged exposure to digital devices may exacerbate the symptoms of presbyopia, a common vision condition which, along with affecting eyesight, can leave sufferers with eyestrain and neck pain.

Presbyopia is an age-related condition, estimated to affect more than 2.2 million Kiwis aged over 40. The number of Kiwis in this age bracket is expected to increase to 2.6m by 2028, according to government statistics.

The disorder results in the eye being no longer able to focus on near objects. It is often characterised by digital device users needing to hold their phone further away from their face, or needing brighter lights to read by.

Optometrist Bruce Nicholls says the strain caused by trying to focus on small print, for long periods, can cause headaches and tired, or sore eyes.

He says that constantly switching our focus between devices, such as smartphones, tablets and PCs, as well as hard copies of printed pages, is putting our eyes under an unnatural level of stress. "Presbyopia is a normal condition, which has always been present in humans but in recent

years, our increasing dependence on digital devices has meant the frequency of symptoms like headaches, eye strain and neck pain occurring, seems to be on the rise.

"For many people, devices are in constant use, from the time we wake up, until the time we go to sleep.

"Many of us simply transition from one device to another, through the day, which places continuous pressure on eye muscles that become less able to handle this kind of workload as we age," he says.
